Little Can - Big Impact

The Blue Can campaign is an outreach of the Correctional Facilities Committee by which AA members donate money to purchase AA Conference-approved literature for inmates in local, county, and state jails, as well as state and federal prisons.

Your group treasurer counts and mails these monies to the SETA CFC at the address printed on the Blue Can. This may be done monthly or as-needed (when can is full). These monies are separate from any regular donations the group makes to SETA as they are set aside for the specific purpose of purchasing AA literature for inmates.

The CFC provides support to incarcerated men and women seeking recovery by taking meetings inside correctional facilities, distributing literature purchased with Blue Can donations, answering letters from inmates, setting up contact for pre-release inmates and presenting information and literature at workshops and conferences.

AA MILESTONES IN MARCH

1938 Bill Wilson begins writing the Big Book

- 1941 Saturday Evening Post article by Jack Alexander created national sensation. AA membership quadrupled in one year from 2000 to 8000
- 1944 New York Intergroup established
- 1947 Nell Wing, Bill Wilson's secretary and first AA archivist, began her career at the Alcoholic Foundation office First AA group formed in London, England
- 1951 Dr. William D. Silkworth died at Towns Hospital
- 1966 Ebby Thacker, Bill Wilson's sponsor, died sober
- 1978 The Grapevine circulation reaches 100,000
