Our all or nothing nature


I am in awe of Alcoholics Anonymous. Even the greatest minds in psychology, with eight years of college and a published dissertation, still cannot help alcoholics stay sober with therapy alone. Yet through AA, those who did not go to college, or who dropped out to focus on their drinking (like me), have helped many.

Perhaps it's because therapists believe that peace and happiness come from moderation. But we are all or nothing people. We drink or we don't. There's nothing in between. And that pretty much explains our recovery. There is no moderation in our twelve step program because "half measures availed us nothing."

An interesting line was deleted in *The Original Working Manuscript* of the book

Alcoholics Anonymous that reveals more of Bill Wilson's all or nothing nature, and set the tone for AA's program of recovery. Right after the "How it Works" excerpt that is often read at meetings, Bill Wilson wrote, "If you are not convinced on those vital issues, you ought to re-read the book to this point or else throw it away!" I can see why it was deleted, but I love his all or nothing spirit. And I love our all or nothing nature. It urges us down the path our founders have forged: A life built on the principles of honesty, humility, and service.

Because for us, every day is a life or death situation — an all or nothing decision. That's why Bill Wilson wrote, "God either is, or He isn't. What was our choice to be?"

So each morning, I thank my higher power for the gift of sobriety and ask for guidance in the coming day. And over time, the peace and happiness that once eluded me, is gently settling in.
