Jack Alexander's 1941 article on

Alcoholics Anonymous burst onto the scene and ignited a revolutionary shift in how society views and treats alcohol addiction. With passion and empathy, Alexander's article debunked the prevailing notion that alcoholism was merely a moral failing. It boldly declared that alcoholism is a disease, deserving of compassion and understanding. By sharing powerful stories of individuals who had triumphed over their addiction through the transformative power of Alcoholics Anonymous, Alexander sparked a beacon of hope for countless others who were trapped in the grip of alcoholism. His article became a rallying cry, an affirmation that recovery was possible and that no one should suffer in silence or isolation.
